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#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To: The Board of

Sheep River Regional Utility Corporation

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Sheep River Regional Utility Corporation which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2024, and the statements of operations, change in net financial debt and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the corporation as at December 31, 2024, its results of operations, change in net financial debt and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the corporation in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the corporation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the corporation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the corporation's financial reporting process.

#### Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the year ended December 31, 2024

1. Nature of operations

Sheep River Regional Utility Corporation is constituted under the Municipal Government Act and was approved by the Minister of Municipal Affairs on for the purpose of (the "company") was incorporated under the Business Corporations Act of Alberta on June 30, 2013. It operates under a Ministerial Order pursuant to section 250 of the Municipal Governments Act of Alberta. The company was incorporated for the purpose of operating the supply, treatment and transmission

The members of the company are the Town of Diamond Valley, Foothills County, and the Village of Longview.

The company is exempt from income taxation under Section 149 of the Canada Income Tax Act.

### 2. Significant accounting policies

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards and reflect the assets, liabilities, revenues and expenses, and change in the financial position of the company. Significant aspects of the accounting policies adopted by the company are as follows:

#### (a) Revenue recognition

Variable and fixed water revenues are recognized as revenue in the period in which the service is delivered or in which the transactions or events occurred that gave rise to the revenue.

### (b) Valuation of financial assets and liabilities

## (c) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian public sector accounting standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenue and expense during the period. Where measurement uncertainty exists, the financial statements have been prepared within reasonable limits of materiality. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### (d) Budget amounts

The budget amounts presented on the statement of operations are taken from the company's annual budget. Certain budget amounts have been reclassified to conform with the current year's financial statement presentation.

#### 2. Significant accounting policies

#### (e) Non-financial assets

Non-financial assets are not available to discharge existing liabilities and are held for use in the provision of services. They have useful lives extending beyond the current year and are not intended for sale in the normal course of operations. The change in non-financial assets during the year, together with the excess of revenues over expenses, provides the Change in Net Financial Debt for the year.

#### (i) Tangible capital assets

Tangible capital assets are recorded at cost which includes all amounts that are directly attributable to acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset. The cost, less residual value, of the tangible capital assets is amortized on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life as follows:

Full annual amortization is charged in the year of acquisition and none in the year of disposal. Assets under construction are not amortized until the asset is available for productive use.
